
North Star Chapter Annual Spring Banquet

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Remembering Rose

We lost another daughter of the prairie recently. Born of German-Russian immigrants and raised in rural Grant County, ND, Rose Doll Wood landed in urban Minnesota as a young wife and mother. The tenacity, optimism, and work ethic vital to survival on the prairie accompanied her to the city when she and husband Bob landed in Richfield some 40 years ago.

I met Rose and Bob in 1978 when the North Star Chapter of Minnesota was chartered as a chapter of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia (AHSGR). The North Star Chapter was unique in that members lived all over the large Minneapolis/St. Paul metro area and descended from colonies representing all parts of South Russia. A positive reality if you desire to learn about the different groups, not always so easy when distance and differences are thrown into the mix

Those early members worked at building a solid community with a focus on education and maintaining the culture. They funded mailings, hosted events in their homes, and forged ahead with a vision to create a strong organization. Rose and Bob each held offices in the organization and were part of the glue that held the North Star Chapter together in those founding years.

The Wood home was often the site of North Star Chapter board meetings or event planning meetings. But my most memorable gatherings were in Rose's basement workroom. Rose had an upholstery business and for years the North Star Chapter newsletter was assembled on the giant cutting table in that room.

We used to joke that we were simply replacing our grandmother's quilting circle. In truth, the dynamic was the same. Over time we

got to know one another like family. In those couple of hours we would assemble, staple, label, stamp, seal, and organize by zip code, all the while sharing stories and chatting about our lives, our families, our research, our hometowns, recipes, travel, hopes, and dreams. In a way those newsletter assembly nights four times a year did as much to cement the future of the North Star Chapter as any chapter meeting or event could. We would end the evening around her dining room table with coffee and some tasty delicacy she whipped up for us. But most important we all were embraced by the knowledge that even though our families lived miles from our urban setting, we were like family for those few hours in her home.

Over time, there was a budget to pay a printer to do all the assembling. The torch passed and others assumed the mantle of chapter leadership. Rose and Bob always stayed involved. For years they handled the shipping duties for our wildly successful chapter cookbook, "Sei Unser Gast."

Rose's death in January 2009 brought all those long ago memories flooding back. She passed into death much the way she lived her life – with grace and dignity - leaving her imprint on our history.

Opportunities Lost and Found

I had planned to share with you some ideas from a book I recently read describing the author's belief that cultural legacy is extremely important in forming who we are, even if we are very far from our country or heritage of origin. It helps explain why centuries of rice farming help Asians excel at math, and why many Southerners still carry the fighting spirit of their warrior Scots-Irish ancestors. But while I was forming my thoughts, I got some bad news: my greatuncle, my family history mentor, unexpectedly passed away at the age of 70.

I'm not close to many of my great-aunts and uncles. My parents have 30 aunts and uncles between them, and that doesn't include the spouses. But Uncle Mal was different. When I was a little girl, he retired from the military to his hometown, right next to mine. A lifelong bachelor, he was often included in our family events. His major pursuit during his retirement was genealogy. He was an active member of GRHS, and wrote a book about the history of his hometown. He is featured in the film "Prairie Crosses. Prairie Voices" because his father was a blacksmith who made iron crosses. We quietly bonded over our love of family history. After I gave a dinner speech at the 2002 GRHS convention, he told me, "Your grandfather would be so proud." It's a compliment I'll treasure all my life.

I was going to treat myself to a long visit with him this summer. I'm working on a family history book commemorating the 100th anniversary next year of the Millers arriving in America. But now he's gone, and with him, the answers to so many questions I still have. He was the youngest of eight children, all gone now except for one. I don't feel in any way competent enough to fill his shoes as the family historian, but out of his dozens of nieces and nephews, I'm the one

who shared his passion.

Unfortunately, this is an experience I suspect many of you have had, and the regret never gets easier. Even if you've heard this a million times, I'm going to say it again, especially since we have a wonderful opportunity with our March program. Please get your stories down. If all you can do is record the bare facts, do it. Please interview your relatives. Don't think you have time, or you'll do it next year. Pick up the phone, write a letter, take a drive, and do it now. I celebrate my uncle's life and am so thankful for the gifts he shared with me. But my heart sinks when I think of the information that now rests with him forever. I plan to honor his memory by making sure I get as many stories as I can recorded now, before it's too late.
