STILL (as in "are you STILL Jewish?") by Rebecca Bender and her father, Kenneth Bender, takes us on a journey through five generations of migration over 150 years.

The Bender Family story takes us from a small village in Ukraine, to the city of Odessa on the Black Sea, traveling under secret arrangement to exit Russia, choosing to homestead on the rocky prairie of south-central North Dakota, to a thriving general store business in Eureka, South Dakota (the Odessa of the North); then Kenneth Bender's service as a U.S. soldier in the European theatre in WWII, returning home to marry, raise a family in St. Louis Park, MN, and build a successful Federated store franchise in North Minneapolis.

Then . . . the story of the generations of the Bendersky/Bender family comes full circle and takes us back to North and South Dakota to honor the Jewish pioneers interred in a tiny cemetery on the prairie. Rebecca Bender's dedication in her journey to list the cemetery on the National Register of Historic Places is a story all by itself.

This immigrant family was dedicated to being good citizens of their adopted country while still observing their Jewish customs. Creatively finding work options off the farm, making do, having fun, staging plays, bringing musical theatre to the prairies, learning from their German-Russian neighbors, being good neighbors, sharing their religious traditions with

neighbors, sharing their religious traditions with others – all of this can be found in *Still*, a fine addition to ethnic prairie literature.

Published in 2019 by North Dakota State University Press, *Still* by Rebecca Bender won the 2019 Independent Press Award (Judaism category).

Find-A-Grave: Bob Rowe on "Using Cemetery Data in Your Family History Research"


Find A Grave is a virtual cemetery, an online database with data on millions of the dear departed. Greatly expanded from its humble beginnings, the website

contains cemetery data, along with family connections, obituaries, and photos. This is a great tool for genealogists, along with other sources of data. It can also be helpful in making contact with others researching your same family.

Joining us in October to explain the features of the **Find A Grave** website, Bob Rowe is a member of several local genealogy societies. His interest in genealogy began in the 1980s, when ads for Family Tree Maker software caught his eye. Bob began seriously researching genealogy in 1999; then joined **German Genealogy Society** (GGS) in 2001.

Bob became proficient in developing websites. He helped build **GGS** websites and the new International German Genealogy Partnership website, and became webmaster for both groups. Bob is also webmaster for Minnesota Genealogical Society, Norwegian-American Genealogical Association, the Pommern Regional Group, Swedish Genealogy Society, and the Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society.

Bob is a volunteer in the Enterprise Technology Department at the Minnesota Historical Society in Saint Paul. He also corrects the birth and death records in their databases, and adds thousands of missing records to the death database.



Bob is one of four primary people who helped add the nearly 20,000 burials at Acacia Park Cemetery in Mendota Heights to the website. When he worked at a nearby business, Bob spent many lunch hours at the cemetery taking pictures of graves, and attached the images to the appropriate **Find-A-Grave** memorials.

Bob's interest in genealogy gave him incentive to travel. In an online search, his daughter found a cemetery in Canada with about 30 people named Rowe. Bob thought

"What are the chances we are related to any of them?" Well, he is related to ALL of them! Bob traveled to Canada to visit that cemetery in 2001. He also discovered a fourth cousin living just down the street from the cemetery, and hopes to make another trip to Canada to visit more cemeteries where relatives are buried.

Bob's online tree connected him to cousins in Norway. In 2012 they invited him to a family reunion outside of Tromsø, on the far northwestern coast. This area is home of the indigenous Sami people. Bob's great grandparents were full-blooded Sami who lived northeast of Tromsø and immigrated to America.

Volunteerism has become Bob's passion during retirement. Bob enjoys staying busy and uses his talents to help others. Bob has presented on this topic to GGS, the Pommern Regional Group, the 3-M Genealogy Society, Dakota County Genealogical Society, and the 2016 Minnesota Genealogical Society Spring Conference.


Events began on Wednesday afternoon, July 31, with an Open

House at North Dakota State University's Germans from Russia Heritage Collection (GRHC) located at the NDSU Libraries. Many exhibits from the GRHC collection were on display. Custard *kuchen* and coffee were served to the large crowd. North Star Chapter's own Jim Gessele was on hand to sign his latest book translation, "*Emilie: The Girl From Bessarabia*," an historical novel by Angela Rommeiss, published in 2019 by GRHS.
